Mission Statement:

At Brookhurst, we will create a positive, connected community of caring students who are actively engaged in learning about themselves, their community, and the world. We work to prepare all students with the 21st-century skills necessary to persevere and succeed in a changing world.

Vision Statement:

We will build a community of supportive and caring students who have the foundational skills that will help them to be successful in high school and beyond.

Highlights:

Twelve percent of students are enrolled in the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program. AVID students are encouraged to take a rigorous honors course load. Other electives include band, drama, choir, home economics, computers, art, yearbook, and ASB (Associated Student Body activities program).

Approximately 25% of students participate in after-school sports programs. Each sport has a separate 7th- and 8th-grade team for both boys and girls. Sports which are offered include: volleyball, soccer, basketball, tennis, track, football, softball, cross country and swimming.

Demographic Information:

Brookhurst Junior High School, located in Anaheim, California, serves 1, 053 students, in which 85% participate in the free and reduced meal program, and 23% are English Learners. The demographic profile also indicates the following regarding student subgroups: 63% Hispanic, 6% White, 6% Asian, 3% African American, 4% Filipino, and 2% other.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Brookhurst Junior High School opened in 1956. The buildings were most recently modernized in 2003. The 20 acre site includes 35 regular classrooms and several portable classrooms. There are 15 labs, which are designed for specific programs (i.e. computer labs, science labs, choral Music room, etc.). The site also includes a cafeteria, a media center, a gym, and a variety of sports fields.

Maintenance and Repair: Site and District maintenance staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Cleaning Process and Schedule: The District's Board of Trustees has adopted cleaning standards for all schools. The administration works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school. All classrooms and restrooms are cleaned daily. Deep cleaning, including waxing of floors and painting, takes place during times when students are not in classes. Students, parents, and staff are encouraged to report any objectionable conditions via a uniform complaint procedure.

Brookhurst Junior High School believes that education is a shared responsibility where the student, the school, the home, and the community work together toward common goals. Our goal is to provide meaningful educational involvement opportunities for all parents by empowering them to advocate for their children. At Brookhurst, every parent is recruited to partner with the school by participating in School Site Council, Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), District-level English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), and the Superintendent's Advisory Council. Parents have the opportunity to become actively involved in the academic development of their child by checking and discussing the student agenda planner, which every student is expected to use daily to record their class assignments.

In addition, Brookhurst Junior High School invites and provides every parent with the opportunity to attend monthly parent nights. Through our parent counseling presentations, parent leadership academy and our family engagement specialist, we provide workshops that are of interest to parents such as A-G requirements, how to navigate the educational system, anti-bullying, and other important subjects based on parent feedback from an annual needs assessment survey. We also have monthly "Coffee Chat with the Principal," as well as, campus tours, which focus on current issues surrounding education and classroom visitation. The Title I program funds a number of professional development opportunities for Brookhurst Junior High School staff members and also funds parent involvement activities, such as parent resource fairs. Through Title I and Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), Brookhurst Junior High School students receive a variety of strategic reading and mathematics interventions, which are provided to students that are identified through multiple measures, including SBAC testing. Additional instructional assistance and teachers are provided in the areas of reading, math, and ELD are funded through Title II, Title III, and LCFF.

Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

Teachers participate in a variety of District in-services as well as professional development workshops and conferences to enhance their content knowledge and instructional skills. This is in addition to two non-student days and weekly late-start meetings, which are scheduled each year for professional learning activities. New teachers are also required to participate in the Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment (BTSA) program. The District and school continue to train teachers in strategies to deliver a differentiated curriculum with depth and complexity. Teachers learn to utilize students' assessment results in order to target instruction to better meet the individual needs of students. Classified staff members have many opportunities to participate in training designed to enhance their effectiveness with students. All District staff members are supported in their efforts to deliver highly effective lessons. Teachers and administrators are given many opportunities to examine current instructional programs and strategies and realign with state curriculum performance and content standards. Research-based instructional strategies are reviewed and implemented.

In addition to what the district provides, Anaheim High School has weekly professional development opportunities on Tuesday's late start days. The time is utilized by departments, specialized programs, and cross-curricular articulation. All educational staff is involved in a variety of workshops and conferences.
